Member Profile - Beulah Castan - Director



I normally write an account of myself when I have to submit a CV for a job application, but because I have been asked for a profile, I will now endeavour to share with you a brief outline of my diverse career history. Some of this may be known and some may be unknown.

I started my career as a cadet Industrial Chemist when I was 17 years of age. Two years later, having worked all day at Drug Houses of Australia and then going immediately to QUT to study in the evening, catching the last tram home at 11:00pm at night, I decided after hearing how my fellow school friends had graduated as teachers, being paid what seemed to me great wages and also studying at night at the University of Queensland, sounded a much easier option than what I was doing that I would try for a career change and apply to become a Secondary Teacher, Science. Though my first and remaining love is Science, I applied and immediately got accepted to train as a Secondary Teacher (Science). The following year, Industrial Chemistry became a University of Queensland full time subject course. By now I had qualified as a teacher and began my teaching career.

Soon after, I received a life changing phone call from the Head Mistress of BGGs, Louise MacDonald, offering me a position as Head of Department Biological Sciences. It was because of my training as a cadet Industrial Chemist and my different University Subject choices that BGGs felt I was the person they needed. I had the wonderful opportunity of designing a state of the art Science Laboratory that lasted for 20 years before it was upgraded to one of the finest laboratories that I have seen. I was a special guest at the opening of that New Laboratory, in the late 1990's. While at BGGs, I took study leave and went to study Psychology, Guidance and Counselling at the University of California. I was interested in introducing Counselling and Guidance Services to Independent Schools. At that time, I was the Vice-President of the Queensland Association of Teachers of Independent Schools and felt that guidance and counselling services were also needed in Independent Schools as well as parity of wages, males and females, and Independent Schools with State Schools. By the way, we were successful with all of these submissions.

While studying for my Masters Degree at the University of California, I received a second life changing call, that from the Director General of Guidance and Special Education, Dr. Pat Doherty inviting me to become a Guidance Officer. Now, I had found a second love, the love of Psychology, Guidance and Counselling. I took further leave and flew in and arrived on the very day that the course was beginning. I got the taxi to take me from the airport, to the flat that I was sharing with friends, to drop my luggage and then continue to the end of George Street to start my training. It took me some time to adjust to the culture shock of the move from the Independent Education System to the State Education System.

I was involved in training Guidance Officers as a Senior Guidance Officer, and during the first major restructure of the State Education System, I was appointed as the Adviser Special Needs for Metropolitan West Region. A further restructure of the System and I was appointed Principal Education Officer, Student Services at Coopers Plains District. I retired three times and was reappointed as a Senior Guidance Officer (requesting part time status). I have been fortunate in that I have always enjoyed whatever work I was doing. That is why I have not yet hung up my hat.

I have also been the chair on the Board of Migrant Resource Centres assisting refugees and new migrants into this country by setting up support programs, counselling, education and employment training programs.

I have won a number of University Fellowships and Scholarships that have enabled me to teach, study and research in Universities interstate and overseas.

Member Profile - Beulah Castan - Director (Cont.)

I have been an active member of the ACE and was made a life member ten years ago.

I was a volunteer teacher abroad and this was entirely self funded so when I ran out of money I had to return home, but supported the school located in the poor areas of Kowloon, Hong Kong for a further two years. This was one of the most rewarding professional experiences of my life.

I was also a founding member of the Conservationist movement headed by Judith Wright, one of our great national poets. This movement led to the establishment of a Wild Life journal that is still in existence.

I have always been active in supporting women's rights and when I was introduced to Zonta by my good friend Glenda Page, I was delighted as the aims of Zonta appealed to me and I felt fortunate to have an opportunity to meet and become friends with such special and talented women. I was not disappointed and it is something I value though I have in the last few years, because of personal circumstances, not been as active as much as I would have liked.

Finally, I have also been interested in sport, having been a State and National Basketball Player and while a live-in tutor at Women's College, I was in the Women's Four (a very keen rower). I have always loved the water and in the past was a sailor. As I am not as young as I used to be, I have transferred my interests now to the Arts.

I think that brief sketch will suffice. Thank you, one and all.
