#### Reclaim the Night

Reclaim the Night is a global women's protest against men's sexual violence, generally held on the last Friday in October each year. In some countries it is known as Take Back the Night. The philosophy of Reclaim the Night encourages grassroots participation in the organisation of events by as many women as possible. In this way RTN is able to draw together women from diverse backgrounds and experiences to work together in addressing issues of men's sexual violence against women and children. The first Reclaim the Night march in Australia took place in 1978.

The march also challenges the stereotype that women are somehow to blame for being raped because they put themselves in vulnerable situations by what they wear, by being out late at night or by travelling alone. Women should not be expected to change their lifestyle and to confine their activities to certain places and, in particular, to daylight hours so as not to put themselves at risk of being sexually molested or raped.

The theme this year is **Reclaim Your Rights!**

#### Young Women in Science

Whitsunday Anglican School student, Alex Robinson, has generously provided scholarship monies awarded to her to host a Young Women in Sciences forum at the Whitsunday Anglican School, August, 28.

Miss Robinson was awarded \$2,500 in scholarship monies for academic excellence through the RSL Youth Development program and Bond University.

Initially she intended to use the scholarship money to travel to London to participate in the International Science Forum but after attending the National Youth Sciences forum in Canberra in January, she decided the money would be better spent offering the same opportunity to Mackay girls, who may not otherwise have access to such an event.

"I was so inspired with my experience in Canberra, I felt as though I wanted to share it with local girls who may also have an interest in a career in science." She said.

"These types of things are often available to students in major cities but are missed in regional places."

The science forum at Whitsunday Anglican School will boast a number of accomplished women speakers working and studying in the science field, including Professor Adele Green who was recently named Queensland's Australian of the Year.

Professor Green will address the forum about her career and achievements in science including her work at the frontline of melanoma research, which is diagnosed in 9000 Australians every year.

Other guest speakers include CQUniversity student Jessica Scoble and Katherine Richardson who is currently in her second year of Environment and Ecology at QUT.

Miss Robinson's sense of community and generosity has been fostered by her participation in the Whistsunday Anglican School's Z cLubs, which is the student incarnation of Zonta International clubs.

The Zonta Club of Mackay now hosts four of the six Z Clubs which have been formed throughout Queensland. Z clubs help high school and university students develop leadership skills, promote career exploration and encourage members to participate in community, school and international service projects.

#### Young Women in Business

Many thanks to the clubs which supported the Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship program this year by offering the scholarship at club level.

As you know, the winners at club level go forward for consideration for the district award. I was very pleased this year that my requests to act as a judge were accepted by experienced business women and academics who worked independently to select the overall district winner, using standard assessment procedures and criteria. In addition, the credibility of the award is protected by ensuring that the judges do not know any of the candidates, with particular attention given to ensuring that academic judges are not employed at a university where a finalist is enrolled as a student.

As a result of that rigorous process, a district winner for 2013 has now been selected and I am delighted to advise that <u>Teegan Green</u>, the nominee of the Zonta Club of Brisbane North, has been selected as the District winner of the Jane M. Klausman Scholarship for 2013.

Teegan is a truly outstanding candidate and was unanimously selected by the judges as the winner.

As a measure of her standard and achievements, she has completed four undergraduate degrees in eight years and has just been accepted directly into a PhD program at The University of Queensland in Business Management. As well as her business management degree (with first class honours and the University Medal), she has two BAs with majors in English, Chinese and Japanese, and a BEd which makes her a qualified teacher. In each of her 16 semesters of study, she received the Dean's Commendation for academic excellence and she was also chosen as overall winner of the University's inaugural Three Minute Thesis Competition for honours theses across all disciplines. Moreover, she was Valedictorian at her Graduation Ceremony in July.

**But that's not all! She has worked part**-time to support herself throughout her studies, plays in a chamber ensemble, and has worked as a volunteer with Indigenous students and as a note-taker for students with disabilities.

Teegan has clear and realistic goals to be a serious leader in both the corporate world and academia and is already striding out on the path towards making an impressive contribution to improving the status of women.

She is a star to watch and I look forward to hearing next month whether she is one if the seven recipients at international level.

# BEHIND EVERY GOOD MAN IS...

"No man succeeds without a good woman behind him." – Harold MacMillan.

An asset? Someone with a bit of sex appeal? TRACEY SPICER bemoans the turning back of the clock.

It's the new pink: The good woman behind the man.

They stand decoratively by their "great man", smiling yet silent. On the odd occasion they're allowed to speak, every word is scripted.

Wouldn't want the little lady having a mind of her own, would we? She's an appendage, an accoutrement: an asset.

Jessica Rudd and the Abbott sisters are articulate, likeable, sassy women.

Frances and Bridget looked mortified when their Dad told Big Brother housemates, "If you want to know who to vote for, I'm the guy with the not bad looking daughters".

To see them reduced to this is a sad indictment on modern society. Former British PM Harold MacMillan spoke about this syndrome early last century.

**Yet here we are, in the 'new world' in 2013, choosing between be**-suited men, flanked by good women.

The highest profile female politician has been the candidate for the marginal seat of Lindsay, Fiona Scott, because of her "sex appeal".

A valiant second is Finance Minister Penny Wong, left to clean up the mess after her man shot off his mouth about an alleged 10 billion dollar black hole in the Coalition's costings.



Third is the perfectly poised, yet strangely silent, Deputy Opposition Leader Julie Bishop. No doubt she's been told to put a sock in it, after repeated gaffes.

What happened to the Women for Gillard? The fourth wave of feminism? Misogyny on the front page?

When I worked at Channel 9 in Melbourne 20 years ago, we formed a fun female support group called the "pussy mafia".

Working in a male-dominated environment, you do everything you can to break down structural discrimination. I reckon it's time for a pussy mafia in Canberra.

Because, come Saturday night, we're turning back the clock to the 1950s and I, for one, am not feeling "relaxed and comfortable".

For a taste of it, tune in to any of the commercial TV or radio stations for their election coverage. Channel 9's is being hosted by the legendary Laurie Oakes, Channel 7 has the capable Mark Riley, Channel 10 boasts the inscrutable Hugh Riminton, while Sky News will showcase the superb David Speers and Kieran Gilbert. They're all experienced and talented political reporters. But they're all men.

At the ABC, only one woman will sit on the panel come election night — Annabel Crabb — while not even the sharp-witted political interviewer Leigh Sales gets a guernsey. On Radio 2UE, the forensic John Stanley is assisted by Nick Minchin and Mark Latham, while 2GB's Alan Jones is joined by conservative stable mate Andrew Bolt.

At least he can't accuse women of Destroying the Joint: there's barely enough to make a dent.

It seems little has changed since I reported on the federal election in the early 90s. (Hawkie was so pumped after our interview, he grabbed me on the bum. Ah, those were the days.)

Decades later, we're still surrounded by images of women as decorative items.

Scratch the surface and — oh hang on, don't scratch the surface. You might damage your delicate skin!

Commentators gush over Jane Fonda as the new face of a skin care label because, "It's wonderful that older women as seen as beautiful".

Will you please all just SHUT UP!

Number one, Jane Fonda doesn't look like a normal 75 year old. Number two, she has more dollars than sense. Number three, we shouldn't be celebrated for our looks. You don't see Sean Connery doing skin care commercials.

It kills me. Do whatever you want to your face or body, but it's not your only currency.

I hope I live to see the day when a female Prime Minister and Opposition Leader are fighting it out for the top job, with their "good men" behind them.

This battle would be broadcast by commentators of mixed gender, age and ethnicity, representing the diversity of our community.

It's time to shine a bright fuchsia light on this nasty new normal.


