
Support for Revival of Rural Community-based Self Help Initiatives in Sri Lanka

Project Focus: Women's Economic Self-Sufficiency

The Tsunami Disaster in December 2004 caused severe damage to the economic and social structures in Sri Lanka.



Women in the Northern Regions have traditionally engaged in various productive and trading activities such as production of spices (curry powder, chilli powder, etc.)

for cooking, chicken farming, cattle and vegetable farming, goat farming, pottery, tailoring, and "art and crafts." They are major agricultural workers in subsistent farming and they sell their merchandise to traders who send the products to bigger markets.

A number of families became female-headed households because of conflict and the Tsunami, and the burden on women has become substantial. As members of female-headed households, they face an uphill battle to survive and raise their children.¹ The high number of female-headed households and widows characterizes the poverty in the North and East Regions of Sri Lanka.

Australia's Response to FGM

As a signatory to a number of international conventions dealing with women's and children's rights, the Australian Commonwealth Government in partnership with the states and territories has committed to a National Education Program on FGM (NEPFGM), which aims to prevent the occurrence of FGM in Australia through an emphasis on community education, information and support. **Specific legislation banning FGM has been enacted in all States and Territories bar Queensland and Western Australia, where legislation against FGM relies on the Criminal Code in relation to assault.** In those states where legislation has been passed penalties of up to 7 years imprisonment apply to persons convicted of intentionally performing FGM, or for taking or arranging for a child (defined as a person under 18 years of age) out of a jurisdiction for the purpose of performing FGM. Exceptions are made in the case of medical procedures that have a 'genuine therapeutic purpose'.

FGM affects births

The first comprehensive study of the effects of female genital mutilation on women and babies during childbirth has been published by leading medical journal, *The Lancet*.

The study, which provides the first reliable evidence that female genital mutilation can adversely affect birth outcomes, was undertaken by African and international researchers, including Associate Professor Emily Banks from the National Centre for Epidemiology and Population Health at ANU.

It involved 28,393 women in 28 obstetric centres in six countries: Burkina Faso, Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, Senegal and Sudan.

The study found that women who have had Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) are significantly more likely to experience difficulties during childbirth and that their babies are more likely to die as a result of the practice. Complications include the need to have a caesarean section, dangerously heavy bleeding after the birth of the baby and prolonged hospitalisation following the birth.

The degree of complications increased according to the extent and severity of the FGM.

According to the WHO, FGM is a common practice in a number of countries around the world, and over 100 million women and girls are estimated to have had FGM. The study used a three level scale set out by the WHO on FGM severity.

In the case of caesarean section, women who have the most severe form of FGM will have on average 30 per cent more C-sections compared with those who have not had any FGM. Women affected by severe FGM are 70 per cent more likely to suffer haemorrhage after birth.

Joy Phumaphi, the Assistant Director General, Family and Community Health at the WHO, which organised the study, said: "We should not underestimate the significance of this study. For the first time we have the evidence that deliveries among women who have been subject to FGM are significantly more likely to be complicated and dangerous. (Australian National University)

FGM has become an issue in Australia as a result of migration. There is no documented evidence that FGM is practised in Australia; however substantial numbers of anecdotal accounts exist.
